A MESSAGE FROM Father Jesus

BROTHERS AND SISTERS,

As we get closer to the end of our liturgical year, which will conclude this month with the celebration of the solemnity of Christ the King, the Church will help us meditate about the ending of times, and more importantly, the ending of our own time here on earth, which is what I want to reflect on today. Let me begin by asking, how do you prepare yourself for your last day? It is an uncomfortable question, but at the same time, a necessary one to keep in mind, not to stress us out or make us anxious or depressed, but rather, to strengthen our faith in God. We all want to meet the Lord face to face, but for this to happen, there is a necessary step we all have to take sooner or later: facing death. Far from being a scary situation, we should look at it with eyes of faith and hope knowing that for our God nothing is impossible (Lk. 1, 37; Mk. 10,27), and even death has been conquered by Him who is our strength, Jesus Christ, our King (1 Cor. 15:55-58). Because of this, we shouldn't fear death, rather, we should prepare ourselves for that moment with a heart filled with hope.

When would our last day be? We don't know. Then, how do we prepare ourselves for that day if we don't even know when it will be? It's definitely not by living in fear of dying at any moment, but rather, by truly living the present because that is what God is asking us to do; to focus on doing what we are supposed to be doing at the moment we are in. A good example of this comes from St. Louis de Gonzaga. When he was young, someone approached him while he was enjoying his recreation time at school and said: "Suppose that at this very moment, someone were to come telling you that the end of the world would take place in a moment, that you would appear before God, that you would be judged by the Supreme Judge, and that your eternity would be decided by his decision. What would you do? The young Louis de Gonzaga answered: "Well, I would keep on playing ball!". You may ask, why? Well! because it was recreation time, and there is time for everything according to God's will (Eccles. 3:1-8).

In short, one way to prepare ourselves for our last day would be by fully living the present, but we need to make sure we live the present in a state of grace. How do we do that? By active participation in the Church's sacramental life, particularly, a frequent partaking of the Holy Eucharist and the sacrament of reconciliation, along with an intentional resolution of staying away from mortal sin.

It is important to be aware of the fact that the current situation of our world, with its cultural and moral values in decay, makes it harder for all of us to escape from sin, which seems to be chasing us wherever we go, at home by fighting with the family, at work by gossiping about our neighbor, while driving by losing patience with other drivers in the middle of traffic, on the movies by suggestive languages and scenes, and the list goes on; unending occasions of sin meet us everywhere at any time, and the danger is that, in the same way, death can meet us around the corner at any moment, finding us in mortal sin, and condemning us to eternal damnation. Far from making us anxious, it should encourage us to seriously consider taking advantage of the means of salvation offered by God through His Church.

How wonderful would it be if, at our time of death, a priest could be at our side, offering us the last rites and providing us with the Food for the Journey, sadly, that may not be possible for most of us, first, because of the uncertainty of the time of death in the current world (accidents of any type, violence, etc.). Secondly, because of the constant decrease in number of priests around us. In the past, our grandparents and parents were able to call the priest in the moment of agony, and due to the great number of priests in rectories, many were able to assist the dying, but in our current situation, with fewer men answering to God's calling to the priesthood, we must prepare ourselves in advance for that moment, aware that we may not have the opportunity to be assisted by a priest in our very agony.

First of all, if you are elderly or are already dealing with a chronic illness, do not wait until things get really bad to call the priest to anoint you. Receiving the sacrament of Anointing of the Sick doesn't mean that you are going to die, as many people think, rather, it is a sacrament full of prayers asking God to restore the health of the one who is being anointed. It comforts, gives peace and courage, and even provides forgiveness of sins if the sick person is not able to make a confession.

Here you may say: "It doesn't apply to me, I am a young and healthy person." Well, sadly death doesn't discriminate, and it can come at any time. For you, I have some advice that I heard from a wise and holy Jesuit priest from Spain, Fr. Jorge Loring of blessed memory. He used to emphasize God's mercy, and how easy it was to receive it, we just need to ask for it. St John presents it to us in this way: "If we confess our sins, He is faithful and just and will forgive us our sins and purify us from all unrighteousness." (1 Jn 1,9). Now, we face one problem, would you be able to ask for forgiveness at the time of dying? What if you die in an accident? What if you die while asleep? Based on this uncertainty, besides frequent participation in the sacrament of reconciliation, we should make the act of contrition part of our daily prayers. Fr. Loring suggests an easy one to say, which is at the same time very easy to remember: "My God, forgive me."

What makes it an act of contrition is the fact that we ask God's forgiveness out of love for him by using the expression "My God" which is loving, and the request "forgive me" which implies repentance. This may not be compared to the sacramental absolution, but it at least saves us from eternal damnation through the appeal of God's mercy just as the Good Thief who was crucified alongside Jesus (Lk. 23 39:43). Fr. Loring advises us to do a daily examination of conscience reflecting on what we have done during the day, then, we should heartfeltly say: "My God, forgive me. My God, forgive me. My God, forgive me." (three times as an appealing to the Holy Trinity).

What to do when you find yourself in a situation where a loved one is dying but there is not a priest available? Use the same formula. Instead of falling in despair or getting angry for not being able to reach a priest, Fr. Loring suggests we whisper in the dying person's ear many times "My God, forgive me" to invite the agonizing person to appeal to God's mercy. If the person accepts your words and repeats them, even if only in his mind and heart, you may have saved him from eternal damnation by the merits of Christ, and you may have given him the greatest gift he may have ever received. Even when this is not an official teaching of the Church, it doesn't conflict with it, and as a pious act of mercy, we should practice it, not only for the salvation of our souls but also for the salvation of those around us.

LET US PRAY Together

We are in the world, but we are not for the world (Jn. 17:11, 14–15), for this reason, enjoy this world that God has created and entrusted to us, but do not lose sight of the Eternal Home God has prepared for you and I, instead, let us get ready to take possession of the inheritance God has promised to us with Mother Mary and all the saints in heaven.

"... Holy Mary, Mother of God, pray for us sinners, now and at the hour our death. Amen."



Volunteers are NEEDED to make Sack Meals and to help with service on Wednesday nights. To make this a success consistently each week, we need 200 individuals/families to commit to donating at least once a month.

Each sack meal should contain:

- 2 lunchmeat sandwiches with no condiments, cheese is optional but a nice addition



SAVE THE DATE — COMMUNITY OF SANT'EGIDIO CHRISTMAS LUNCH

"When you give a dinner or a banquet, do not invite your friends or your brothers or your kinsmen or rich neighbors, lest they also invite you in return, and you be repaid. But when you give a feast, invite the poor, the aimed, the lame, the blind, and you will be blessed, because they cannot repay you. You will be repaid at the resurrection of the just". Luke 14: 12-14

The Christmas Lunch with the poor is a tradition of the Community of Sant'Egidio since 1982, when a small group of poor people were welcomed at the banquet table in the Basilica of Santa Maria in Trastevere. There were about 20 people invited: some of our elderly friends from the neighborhood and some homeless people we had got to know from the streets of Rome.

More than 40 years have passed since that first Christmas lunch. From that moment on, the banquet table has become larger and larger, and from Trastevere it has reached many parts of the world. The Christmas lunch has truly become a worldwide Feast. The feast has widened year after year, like a beneficial contagion, and has reached many countries of the South of the world.

In 2018, about 240,000 people gathered for the Christmas lunch in more than 600 cities and 78 countries of the world. **Chicago will celebrate the third Christmas lunch on Sunday December 22, 2024.**

The Christmas feast takes place everywhere, but above all where there is sorrow. INTRODUCING PUSHPAY

We are in the process of rolling out our new electronic giving platform called Pushpay. This new platform will help to streamline the operations of our electronic giving. The software integrates fully with our database and church management system which will give our parish leadership more opportunity to engage with our parishioners on multiple levels. The ease at which someone can donate to the parish will be much enhanced and easy to do with most one-time donations taking less than a minute.

Those who give on a recurring basis will be able to select multiple options for recurring gifts and view their account at any time to know how they are contributing.
