

## A MESSAGE FROM Father Jesus

#### **DEAR PARISHIONERS AND FRIENDS,**

A few years ago, while I was in seminary, I had the opportunity to go to the Holy Land. Along with my classmates, I had the chance to visit the holy sites of our faith and study the Scripture where most of the events of our History of Salvation took place.

After spending a few days by the Basilica of the Annunciation in Nazareth, we went to a small site named Tabgha, located at the shore of the Sea of Galilee, very close to Capharnaum. Welcoming us there was a spectacular and peaceful sunset reflecting over the water of the sea. It was like an invitation to enter into a more contemplative stage of our pilgrimage.

In that area, we visited the Church of the Primacy of St. Peter. It is the place where John 21, 14-17 happened. In this Gospel passage, Jesus asked Peter: Do you love me? Peter replied: "Yes, Lord, You know I love You." Then Jesus said to him: "Feed My lambs." The answer to this question was very important to Jesus, for this reason, He asked again: "Do you love me?" To Peter's affirmative answer, Jesus replied: "Shepherd My sheep." Jesus asked the same question one more time. Once again, Peter gave a positive answer, then Jesus said: "Feed My sheep."

As Christians, this same question is asked to us by Jesus in our daily lives. This question demands an active and affirmative response. "Do you love me?" is not a romantic question that looks for a sentimental answer, but a longing for a deep and authentic response manifested through a way of living. It is a "Yes Lord, I love you" by extending our hands to our neighbor in need and feeding him, not only with bread, but with Christ Himself present in the Eucharist, in the Holy Scripture, and within ourselves. Our love for Christ should be reflected in our love for our neighbor. They are the lambs and sheep Jesus asks us to shepherd and feed.

Near the Church of the Primacy of St. Peter is the Church of the Multiplication. Here is where Jesus miraculously multiplied five loaves and two fish to feed five thousand men. Here, continuing with the lesson started on the previous site, Jesus gives us a concrete example of what he meant in our previous lesson. We look at Him feeding his people. There is something very interesting in this passage of the Gospel that resounded in my heart: "There is a little boy here who has five barley loaves and two small fish. But what are these among so many people?" (John 6: 1-14). Yes, it was Jesus who performed the miracle, but it was possible because a "little boy" shared all that he had and put it in Jesus' hands.

For some of the Apostles, what that "little boy" offered was nothing in comparison with the present need, but for Jesus that "littleness" was sufficient to perform a great miracle. Just like that "little boy," we are invited to bring to Jesus all that we have. It doesn't matter if it looks "too little" that it makes our name not to be found "worthy" to be remembered, just like the one of this "little boy". We live in a society where we are taught that our importance lies in how many times our names are written in places, buildings, or walls. The true importance lies in what Jesus can do with whatever we bring to him, and what others can receive through our "littleness." He deserves the glory. Once again, here is Jesus asking: Do you love me? Then, if you do, give me your "littleness" and with that, let me perform great miracles for those in need. The spiritual lesson didn't end there.

In the afternoon of that same day, walking along the shore of the Sea of Galilee, I found a school of fish swimming and jumping very close to the shore. I slowly walked through the water to the place where all those fish were. I noticed that water was coming out from between a pile of rocks, and mixed with the water was something that the fish were eating. It was dirt. I looked at the immensity of the sea, and I thought of the many other sources of food from where these fish could feed, but they rather chose the spot that provided easy "food", even if it was not good for them. They were hungry, and whatever was coming out from that pile of rocks was providing food for them. This was the last part of that day's lesson. To me, those fish represented the people who experience hunger for God, for justice, for love, etc., who, in their need, open themselves to

eat whatever spiritual consolation they find around, even if it is mixed with harmful ideologies from the world. Once again, it was an invitation to seriously respond to God's call to guide and feed his people, because the lack of good shepherding endangers the souls of those who search for guidance and food in the wrong places.

We are living in turbulent times caused by a variety of situations, such as extreme weather,

financial struggles, illnesses, fear, etc. We are all affected in one way or another, and these situations strengthen our hunger for answers and food to help us overcome our struggles. It is precisely in these tough times when the voice of Jesus resounds louder in our hearts and minds: Do you love me? If you do, then, trust me!

It is an invitation to all of us to trust the process. Our Lord is the King of kings and the Lord of lords. Let us never forget that God oversees history (Jn. 5,17). We all are hungry, and depending on our situation, we look for ways to mitigate that hunger through different sources: news on TV (many times politically inclined towards one way or another), fake news on social media, superficial friendships that only fill our minds with thoughts that take away our peace, and sometimes even our faith by unjustly criticizing God and his Church. Just like the situation with the fish in the Sea of Galilee, those sources from where we satisfy our hunger are not the best, and sometimes they even poison our minds and souls against God and our neighbor.

The Church is celebrating this year a Jubilee dedicated to the virtue of Hope, we are invited to be "Pilgrims of Hope." As part of this event, we have recently celebrated the Sunday of the Word of God. This must be one of the sources from where we should receive the food that mitigates our hunger. We agree that sometimes God's Word is not easy to digest, either because of cultural differences or due to the challenges that it presents to a soul that wants to grow in holiness. In any case, it is always a good idea to ask the Author of the Scripture, the Holy Spirit, to help us see the light that shines from the wisdom of God, at the same time, let us ask him to grant us the gift of discernment to always be able to welcome what is good for our soul and reject what could affect it.

We all are called to be recipients of God's life-giving food like the five thousand men who ate from the few pieces of bread and fish, and, at the same time, we are called to be sharers of that same food to others in need just as the "little boy" did. We are called to be humble sheep in Jesus' flock just as Peter was led by the Lord, and at the same time, to shepherd with him those who are going astray, just as Peter did with the Church. We all are struggling, but it is precisely in our struggles that our hope is strengthened. Let us abandon ourselves into the hands of God, trusting that He is in charge of the history of our salvation. Let us remember that He has the power to transform a horrible tragedy, such as Jesus' Passion and Death, into a glorious salvific event such as Jesus' glorious Resurrection. If He did it then, just like in many other occasions throughout history, He can do it again with us.

Let us not lose hope, instead, let us pray along with Saint Faustina Kowalska: "Jesus, I trust in you."

#### **WEDNESDAY SOUP KITCHEN**

Volunteers are NEEDED to make Sack Meals and to help with service on Wednesday nights. To make this a success consistently each week, we need 200 individuals/families to commit to donating at least once a month.

We are looking to have <u>50 volunteer make 5 Sack Meals</u> each week.

#### Each sack meal should contain:

- 2 lunchmeat sandwiches with no condiments, cheese is optional but a nice addition
- 2 cheese sticks
- 1 bag of chips (or similar)
- 1 piece of soft fruit (for example, orange, banana, grapes)
   Dessert (cookies or candy bar)
- Beverage (juice box, can of soda, or 8oz water bottle/ sports drink)
- Napkin

Please pack each meal in a gallon-sized plastic bag (like Ziploc). Or please use a plastic grocery bag.

## JUBILEE YEAR of Hope

# Plenary Indulgence for the Observance of the Jubilee of Hope Holy Year

December 29, 2024 - December 28, 2025

Pope Francis has granted special Indulgences to the faithful who observe and take part in the celebration of the Jubilee of Hope.

By participating in any Pilgrimage to the designated Jubilee pilgrimage sites, and while fulfilling the usual conditions (see below), one may gain this special Indulgence. The Pilgrimage could be by an individual, or it could be a group of the faithful from the parish. For example, a parish might organize a group to go to a particular site for the celebration of Mass, or they might organize a group to go together to a particular site for a visit.

#### WHAT MUST ONE DO IN ORDER TO RECEIVE THE SPECIAL PLENARY INDULGENCE?

In order to gain this special Indulgence, a Catholic is required to make sacramental Confession before or after visiting a designated Jubilee pilgrimage site (it may be fulfilled by celebrating the sacrament at the site during the parish's regularly scheduled times), receive the Eucharist at Mass before or after visiting a designated Jubilee pilgrimage site (it may be fulfilled by participating in Mass during the site's regularly scheduled times). In addition a person is to make a profession of faith and offer prayers for the Holy Father's intentions.

In addition to and in conjunction with fulfilling these conditions, one may then take part in any of the following observances of the Jubilee of Hope.

Make a pilgrimage to Holy Name Cathedral, or any one of the designated Jubilee pilgrimage sites and there participate in Mass, or the Sacrament of Penance, or take part in another liturgy or devotion (e.g., a liturgy of the word, the Liturgy of the Hours [Morning Prayer or Evening Prayer], the Stations of the Cross, the Rosary).

One may also gain the Plenary Indulgence by visiting one of the designated Jubilee pilgrimage sites and there, for a suitable period of time, engage in Eucharistic adoration or meditation before the tabernacle, concluding with the Our Father, the Profession of Faith (Nicene or Apostles' Creed), and invocations to Mary, the Mother of God.

Sites designated in the Archdiocese of Chicago can be found on the Archdiocesan Jubilee of Hope website (pvm.archchicago.org/jubilee-2025)

Those who for various reasons cannot participate in a Pilgrimage or visit, particularly the sick and people who are elderly and alone, e.g., confined to the home, those incarcerated, can obtain the Jubilee indulgence, under the same conditions if, united in spirit with the faithful who take part in person, they recite the Our Father, the Profession of Faith and invocations to Mary.




The FUNDrive folks were extremely impressed with our performance and are looking for us to repeat campaigns in the future.
