

A MESSAGE FROM Father Sergia

DEAR PARISHIONERS AND FRIENDS,

The first day I met with the Pastoral Council Terese, the Council's chairwoman, gave me a plant as a gift. Of course I was grateful, I thought it was a beautiful gift, but then I thought: is this a test? Those who know me well, know that I am not good at taking care of living things. My insecurities were loud inside my head telling me that whatever happens to that plant will be a reflection of what could happen with the parish under my care. God knows I am a little slow, and subtle signs don't work with me, they go over my head. So, when I entered what was going to be my room at the Rectory, there were five more plants, and in the las three months I have been gifted two more, and I bought myself one orchid.

In the book of Genesis God is presented as a gardener: "and the Lord God planted a Garden eastward, in Eden." (Genesis 2:8) After God created the universe with his Word, he used his hands to plant a garden. I will not take credit for the beautiful garden that is St. Mary of the Lake and Our Lady of Lourdes parish, but I do feel responsible to help it grow and thrive.

Meditating on how different the care for each plant is, I found a resemblance on the diversity of our parish. Some love direct sun light, some need lots of water, some are very sensitive to temperature changes. I could turn these words into a reflection about my responsibility on caring for every member of this community, but I would like to direct the attention on our common responsibility of growing in such a diverse garden. After all, aren't we all our "brother's keeper"?

In a sense, all of us are plants in God's garden and keepers of that same garden. There is a message I have been repeating constantly in one way or another since I arrived here, a parish community is not a place where you get the sacraments but a family in which all of us are responsible for each other.

The main responsibility we have is to love one another. This is not what I think but a command from the Lord Jesus (John 13:34). Being realistic we must confess that loving is hard, but loving in a healthy way is even harder. I am convinced that Jesus' insistence on loving carries in itself the secret to our own personal healing and growth.

I have heard the stories of how this community has come together and grow in the last few years even in the midst of the painful process of closing one of our churches. I see people and entire families participating in our activities, serving in the soup kitchen, preparing food for the homeless, meeting weekly in the diverse devotional and pastoral groups. The quality time you spend here is a sign of your Christian love.

Another sign of your love I have noticed is that even though our community is so diverse, I see your willingness to share with others that may have little in common with you. Things like economic status, gender, sexual orientation, political affiliation, nationality, language,

which in the world become an obstacle for relationships, here is seen as opportunities to build even more meaningful relationships.

Finally, I see an incredible eagerness of this community to serve in the world, to go out and make a difference. This is essential, a Christian community is never self-referential and closed in itself. It cannot be a private club or an exclusive society. I hear every week from people that want to protect and give witness to the dignity of the human life, want to help the most vulnerable in our society, help to bridge the gap between cultures and languages, etc. Many of these initiatives get done in silence, people that don't want to be in the spotlight but are making a difference connecting with each other and helping in concrete ways.

All of you are teaching me how to be the gardener the Lord is calling me to be. I see the way you love each other and the way you take care of the special needs that each one has. I see your need to be creative and get involved and I feel inspired. Thank you because in my story, the plants are teaching the gardener how to do his job.


Please note that any mass intentions received after the 15th OF THE MONTH will not be published in the bulletin, however it will still be prayed for at mass.



Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

For more than a thousand years, the Church has sung five words that capture the message of Easter: Christ our hope has risen.

This simple phrase powerfully expresses the conviction that our hope is the very person of the Risen Christ. He not only rose from the dead two-thousand years ago but is present and active in our world today. As the Risen One, he shares with us his victory and triumph over sin and death, drawing us into the fullness of life that God has ever desired for humanity. Yes, indeed Christ our hope has risen.

We recall this core belief in this Jubilee Holy Year when Pope Francis has called us to be Pilgrims of hope. This is an invitation to be a people who journey together, confident that we are sustained by this closeness to the Risen Christ as we face the challenges of life. WEDNESDAY SOUP KITCHEN

Volunteers are NEEDED to make Sack Meals and to help with service on Wednesday nights. To make this a success consistently each week, we need 200 individuals/families to commit to donating at least once a month.

We are looking to have <u>50 volunteer make 5 Sack Meals</u> each week.

Each sack meal should contain:

- 2 lunchmeat sandwiches with no condiments, cheese is optional but a nice addition
- 2 cheese sticks
- 1 bag of chips (or similar)
- 1 piece of soft fruit (for example, orange, banana, grapes) Dessert (cookies or candy bar)
- Beverage (juice box, can of soda, or 8oz water bottle/ sports drink)
- Napkin

Please pack each meal in a gallon-sized plastic bag (like Ziploc). Or please use a plastic grocery bag.

MARCH 24, 2025 — STATEMENT FROM CARDINAL CUPICH ON ASSISTED SUICIDE

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

As we begin our Lenten journey marked with prayer, fasting and almsgiving, I am writing to let you know that on Ash Wednesday a Senate committee passed a bill, Senate Bill 9, that would legalize assisted suicide in Illinois. This would make it legal for a physician to prescribe an array of lethal drugs to a person diagnosed with a terminal disease who requests to end his or her life. In addition to asking you to offer your Lenten sacrifices to protect life, I ask that you take action by writing, calling or emailing your state elected official to vote "NO" on this legislation. There is also legislation pending in the House, House Bill 1328 as you will see at www.ilcatholic.org or by calling 217-528-9200.

The involvement of insurance companies is alarming. In fact, in states with legalized suicide, there are documented cases of people being denied life-saving medical treatment by insurance companies in lieu of the much cheaper option of life-ending drugs. The poor and those with disabilities are particularly in jeopardy as they are the most vulnerable to such abuses. Every major national organization that represents people with disabilities is opposed to assisted suicide. There is no way to prevent the vulnerable from being coerced or intimidated to end their lives once this assisted suicide is legal. There are simply too many documented cases of the vulnerable being coerced or intimidated into ending their life.

Proponents argue that this legislation will end suffering at the end of life. We all agree that no one should needlessly suffer or have to watch a loved one experience unnecessary pain and suffering. Fortunately, there are now effective ways to make a person more comfortable at the end of life through palliative care, which utilizes physician-led teams to care for the whole person – physically, emotionally, socially and spiritually – to relieve the symptoms and the stress related to serious illness and side effects of treatment.

The American Medical Association (AMA) has summed up the case against assisted suicide well: "Physician assisted suicide is fundamentally incompatible with the physician's role as healer, would be difficult or impossible to control, and would provide serious societal risks." Assisted suicide is not the compassionate solution for those who are suffering. Through palliative care, expanded access to mental health care, and stronger family and community support, providers and families are finding better ways to accompany these people compassionately that shows love and respect for the dignity each human life.

Throughout the year, from December 29, 2024 through December 28, 2025, all are invited to participate in the Jubilee.

Saint Mary of the Lake and Our Lady of Lourdes Parish has been designated as a Pilgrimage Site!

SAVE THE DATE—Monday, April 28, 2025, 6:30 PM All are invited to an evening of prayer, reflection and opportunity to learn more about the Jubilee Year!

WHAT MUST ONE DO IN ORDER TO RECEIVE THE SPECIAL PLENARY INDULGENCE?

In order to gain this special Indulgence, a Catholic is required to make sacramental Confession before or after visiting a designated Jubilee pilgrimage site (it may be fulfilled by celebrating the sacrament at the site during the parish's regularly scheduled times), receive the Eucharist at Mass before or after visiting a designated Jubilee pilgrimage site (it may be fulfilled by participating in Mass during the site's regularly scheduled times). In addition a person is to make a profession of faith and offer prayers for the Holy Father's intentions.

In addition to and in conjunction with fulfilling these conditions, one may then take part in any of the following observances of the Jubilee of Hope.

Make a pilgrimage to Holy Name Cathedral, or any one of the designated Jubilee pilgrimage sites and there participate in Mass, or the Sacrament of Penance, or take part in another liturgy or devotion (e.g., a liturgy of the word, the Liturgy of the Hours [Morning Prayer or Evening Prayer], the Stations of the Cross, the Rosary).

One may also gain the Plenary Indulgence by visiting one of the designated Jubilee pilgrimage sites and there, for a suitable period of time, engage in Eucharistic adoration or meditation before the tabernacle, concluding with the Our Father, the Profession of Faith (Nicene or Apostles' Creed), and invocations to Mary, the Mother of God.
